The PROPOSAL

While Compton always wanted to get married, Blair had been against the idea since she was a teenager. However, after reading a feminist essay by Laurie Penny, she changed her mind, realizing how special marriages can be in these modern times, because for many of women around the world, it is a choice, rather than a necessity.

The WEDDING

Traveling has always been a passion for both the bride and groom, so the pair wanted a wedding that was a true reflection of their personalities and commitment to each other. "Living abroad and traveling has been our life together," Blair says. "We aren't very traditional, so we didn't want our wedding to be either." In a celebration that spanned over a year, the bride packed a vibrant dress that matched her equally colorful hair for each trip, saying "I do" in four stunning locales. In the spring of 2022, the pair first eloped on a boat in the picturesque Galapagos Islands with 18 strangers they met on a cruise. Then, three months later, the groom stepped off a rowboat onto a Bora Bora beach to be wed in a Polynesian ceremony overlooking the sparkling turquoise waters. In December, the grand adventurers were joined by two friends and a local penguin to be wed by the cruise's captain in the snow on continental Antarctica. For the grand finale two months later, the couple drew inspiration from one of their favorite shows, Netflix's *Vikings*, with a historic chapel ceremony on Viking land in Iceland.

The LOOK

The groom's peach-colored suit perfectly complemented the bride's unique dress embellished with a sea of rainbow-colored flowers. "When I bought my dress, I was like 'Wait, how do people only wear this once?' That's not sustainable, that's stupid. So I said, 'Let's just do a year of weddings,' and every time we booked a trip, I looked into whether we could get married there," Blair explained.

Their LOVE STORY

When Zach Jacobs and Savannah Carnes locked eyes across the room at a UC Berkeley law school party, it was like instant tunnel vision. "We knew from the first meeting that it wouldn't be our last," Jacobs says. "We were one of those really disgusting law school couples after we met," Carnes says. "We took every class together, sat next to each other, took notes together." Veganism played a role early on in their relationship, too. So much so that the now lawyers are both doing pro-bono work for The Humane

Society. As a vegan of eight years, Carnes schooled then-vegetarian Jacobs on how to cook soyrizo during one of their first dates. And the rest is history.

The PROPOSAL

Jacobs proposed on the beach during a trip to Hawai'i with both families, and the newly engaged couple spent the day snorkeling, exploring the island, and enjoying the sunshine. They ended the idyllic day watching the sunset with their families, accompanied by the sound of the ceremonial blowing of a conch shell.



The WEDDING

For their international elopement, the couple flew more than 24 hours to Vietnam, where they vacationed for three weeks before embarking on their new careers. "We always knew we wanted to do something a little special and romantic—an adventure. Because what is marriage if not an adventure?" Carnes says. Working with local wedding planners, the private ceremony took place at a lush nature sanctuary in Ninh Binh in Northern Vietnam (the same location that a *King Kong* movie was filmed), accessible only by a rowboat. Under a colorful arch decorated with pink and orange roses, blue hydrangeas, and emerald eucalyptus—just steps away from a river filled with moss and lily pads—the couple exchanged vows and sealed it with a kiss. Afterwards, they enjoyed an intimate vegan dinner decorated with the same multicolored flowers from the ceremony. Back in the US, the newlyweds opted for a vow renewal and a fun reception in the historic library and ballroom of the German Society of Pennsylvania, dancing the night away with friends and family.

The LOOK

The bride chose a strapless, lace Stella York wedding dress from Fairytale Brides in Washington, DC, a secondhand wedding salon that donates proceeds to charities, while the groom opted for a green Sew More Couture vegan suit.

The MENU

Awaiting their return to the resort was a candle-lit dinner of fried yuba spring rolls, vermicelli noodles, and sticky mango rice with coconut milk. For their Philadelphia nuptials, local vegan caterer Chef Lenka Zivkovic pulled out all the stops with charcuterie boards featuring gigantic blocks of plant-based cheese, chicken salad phyllo cups, buffalo cauliflower wings, African peanut stew, mushroom risotto, and smoked beets with yogurt sauce.

The CAKE

Guests at the Philadelphia reception enjoyed an assortment of vegan doughnuts from Dottie's Donuts in flavors like Boston Cream, Blue Raspberry Warhead, Matcha, Pumpkin Spice, and Sweet Potato Pecan.

Between the scenic lake backdrop, antique furniture atop Middle Eastern-style rugs, and rainbow-colored Chinese paper lanterns, the pair created a charming, warm, and relaxed atmosphere for their 90 guests. Duber's groomsmen dressed to fit the theme with thrifted, cowboy-inspired outfits, while Henry's bridesmaids wore lace maxi dresses all representing different colors of the rainbow. The bride and groom incorporated their beloved canine companions in the ceremony with River as the flower girl and Leo as the ring bearer. "They were part of the whole day—they're the reason we met, after all!" Henry says. After the ceremony, the newlyweds took their dinner on a private boat ride around the lake to soak it all in. "It was really special to take that time together alone." The LOOK

The MENU

The entirely customizable, organic menu from Farm to Fork Catering blew away the wedding's mostly non-vegan guests. The cocktail hour included Vietnamese spring rolls with ginger peanut sauce and crispy sesame wontons with curried mango-cilantro yogurt dip. For dinner, a buffet-style taco bar featured two types of fillings: lentil chorizo and sweet-and-spicy cauliflower. A dessert table showcased local Montana fruit ranging from bite-sized huckleberry oat bars to flathead cherry-chocolate cupcakes to blueberry-lemon tartlets.

The CAKE

Montana cottage bakery The Cake Girl created a classic vanilla cake with buttercream frosting, topped with cherries, raspberries, and figs. The dogs also bit into their own vegan peanut butter-banana wedding cake. **W**
